





Pastor's Corner



Walter, Michelle and John Opmeer

Michelle and I have heard many interesting stories from residents over the years. They have been and still continue to be a source of inspiration to us. Here are three quick examples.

As many of you know, both of us were born and raised in The Netherlands. In 1940 Hitler invaded our country. We suffered 5 years of occupation and towards the end of the war, the so-called "hunger winter" of 44/45, mostly in the big cities in the West. The Dutch church came to the help of frustrated parents by offering to find host families in the more rural areas of the country. Our parents took the offer, and so we spent the last months of the war away from home. Michelle ended up far north, and in April 1945 was liberated by the Canadian army. I was liberated a few days earlier farther south. Sixty years later Michelle and I visited a resident who turned out to be a veteran from WW2. Imagine our surprise when it turned out that he had been part of an army detachment that liberated the small village that hosted the 8 year old girl who is now my wife! But there is more: some 8,000 Canadian soldiers gave their lives to liberate the Dutch from Nazi bondage! Another dramatic story. During one Bible study in chapel we talked about life after death. To our surprise there were two residents who had

had a "near death, out of the body" experience. I have no space here to give any details shared. But there are thousands of such documented stories, many of which hint at the reality of life after death.

One more, very quick. Years ago we met a resident with the last name of Scriven. Since one of the most beloved hymns of all time, "What a Friend we have in Jesus" was written by a Joseph Scriven, I asked her, "Are you family?" She was not so sure, but I think so, since it is not a very common name.

When I thought about these three memories (and several others), it dawned on me that they all have something in common. Can you guess? There is someone who came to liberate people from bondage, not to Nazis but to sin. He, too, gave his life to set people free, to become worshippers of their Father in heaven. His name is Jesus, the name above all names. He offers freedom from bondage to sin to all who want to come to know him and trust him. Do you know him already? Then you love to sing, "What a Friend we have in Jesus"! Soon, we are getting ready again to celebrate the birth of Jesus, long foretold by the prophets of old. The world may celebrate it in different ways, but those who open their heart to this Prince of Peace have the joy of knowing the Friend Joseph Scriven wrote about.

Each November, Poppies bloom on the lapels and collars of millions of Canadians. The significance of the Poppy can be traced back to the Napoleonic Wars in the 19th century, over 110 years before being adopted in Canada. Records from that time indicate how thick Poppies grew over the graves of soldiers in the area of Flanders, France. Fields that had been barren before battle exploded with the blood-red flowers after the fighting ended. During the tremendous bombardments of the war, the chalk soils became rich in lime from rubble, allowing the "popaver rhoeas" to thrive. When the war ended, the lime was quickly absorbed and the Poppy began to disappear again. The person who first introduced the Poppy to Canada and the Commonwealth was Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae of Guelph, Ontario, a Canadian Medical Officer during the First World War. John McCrae penned the Poem "In Flanders Fields" on a scrap of paper in May, 1915 on the day following the death of a fellow soldier. Little did he know then that those 13 lines would become enshrined in the hearts and minds of all who would wear them. McCrae's poem was published in Punch Magazine in December of that same year, and the poem

later served as inspiration three

vears later for Moina Michael, an

American teacher, Moina Michael

made a pledge to always wear a Poppy as a sign of Remembrance. During a visit to the United States in 1920, a French woman named Madame Guerin learned of the custom. Madame Guerin decided to make and sell poppies to raise money for children in war-torn areas of France. The Great War Veteran's Association in Canada (our predecessor) officially adopted the poppy as its Flower of Remembrance on July 5, 1921.

Today, the Poppy is worn each year during the Remembrance period to honour Canada's Fallen. The Legion also encourages the wearing of a Poppy for the funeral of a Veteran and for any commemorative event honouring Fallen Veterans. It is not inappropriate to wear a Poppy during other times to commemorate Fallen Veterans and it is an individual choice to do so, as long as it's worn appropriately.

Thanks to the millions of Canadians who wear the Legion's lapel Poppy each November, the little red flower has never died, and the memories of those who fell in battle remain strong.



Remembrance Memories

<u>From W.H. resident (and veteran)</u> Bill Nicholson:

Mons, a city in Belgium, has ties to Canada due to two events. The city was liberated by the Canadians November 10, 1918. While on patrol on the morning of November 11th, 1918 private George Price was shot by a sniper (time: 10:50). Died 10:58, two minutes before the official cease fire.

Pvt. Price is the last known Commonwealth soldier killed during the 1914-1918 war.

Price is buried in a graveyard outside the city. Coincidentally, not far from Price is the grave of the first British soldier killed in the war.
